COLOMBIA: NATURE & AUTHENTIC CULTURE

Our journey through the remote wilderness and heritage-rich coastal cities of Colombia will both open your eyes to the past and enhance your awareness of the present. Set off on an exploration of the Capurgana-Sapzurro trail, a remote tropical region teeming with various species of monkeys, toucans, three-toed sloths, and much more. Or, choose to venture to Panama to explore



the beautiful beachside village of La Miel. In Tuchín, observe the making of the sombrero *vueltiao*, a hat considered the national symbol of Colombia. Feast your eyes on the eclectic Santa Cruz de Lorica, an idyllic riverside gem with Belgian, English, French, Syrian, and Lebanese influences. Visit Santa Cruz del Islote—one of the most densely populated islands on Earth—and chat with local residents.

In addition to abundant treasures on land, you'll also discover vibrant marine life beneath the rippling surface of the Caribbean. Search for wildlife in the hidden coves of rarely visited Cispatá Bay on an evening cruise. The mystery, history, and lively mosaic of the Caribbean are sure to provide a rich trove of memories.

PANAMA: A PROUD PEOPLE, A STORIED PAST

In the Guna Yala archipelago on Panama's Caribbean coast, encounter the remarkable heritage of the indigenous Guna people. Learn about *mola*, the legendary handmade textiles bursting with color, and their origin in female body painting.

PANAMA & COLOMBIA: EXPLORING THE CARIBBEAN COAST

8 DAYS/7 NIGHTS-NATIONAL GEOGRAPHIC QUEST



mmerse yourself in natural and cultural wonders along the Caribbean coasts of Panama and Colombia on a voyage aboard the *National Geographic Quest*. Venture into the lush jungles of Portobelo; spot brightly colored toucans, macaws, and monkeys; and observe the making of the sombrero *vueltiao*. A highlight of your voyage will be a transit of the legendary Panama Canal.

DAY 1: HOME/PANAMA CITY, PANAMA/EMBARK

Upon arrival in Panama City, embark the *National Geographic Quest* to begin our transit of the Panama Canal to the Caribbean Sea. (D)

DAY 2: GATÚN LAKE

By special permission, the ship anchors overnight in Gatún Lake, a vast artificial lake that forms a major part of the Panama Canal. In the morning, visit the Smithsonian Tropical Research Institute and learn about the Barro Colorado Nature Monument, one of the most studied areas of tropical forest on the planet. Hike into the island's jungles or navigate the surrounding waters by Zodiac. Or choose to take a boat to the mouth of the Chagres River to explore the Panama Rainforest Discovery Center. (B,L,D)

DAY 3: PORTOBELO

Arrive along Panama's Caribbean coast and step ashore in the historic town of Portobelo, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Here, numerous walled forts are prominently perched along the coastline, recalling the times when Portobelo was a major Spanish colonial trading center. (B,L,D)

DAY 4: GUNA YALA

Wake up amid the Panamanian archipelago of Guna Yala, a constellation of 368 tiny, white-sand isles off the northeast coast of Panama. Meet the indigenous Guna people and spend the morning among the thatched huts of an island village, learning about Guna culture and handicrafts. Marvel at the intricate designs of handmade textiles called *molas*. In the afternoon, explore the



vibrant marine world around the islands by snorkel, kayak, and stand-up paddleboard. (B,L,D)

DAY 5: SAPZURRO & CAPURGANA, COLOMBIA

National Geographic Quest calls at the wonderfully isolated villages of Sapzurro and Capurgana positioned only three miles apart on the stunning coast of Caribbean Colombia. Set out on a nature walk on the Capurgana-Sapzurro trail. In this area, the ranges of two species of howler monkey overlap as both the mantled and the Colombian red howler monkeys are here. Watch for toucans, parrots, trogons, occasionally scarlet macaws, and possibly three-toed sloths as we traverse the tropical forest trails between the villages. Or, choose a shorter hike that takes us across an international, transcontinental frontier to Panama. Pass through the quick walk-through border crossing perched high on a bluff before descending to the beach at the Panamanian village of La Miel. The sheltered waters of the bay at Sapzurro back in Colombia beckon us for a pleasant kayak or paddleboard around this tropical inlet. We finish our day at sunset in the village of Capurgana.

DAY 6: SANTA CRUZ DEL ISLOTE/SAN BERNARDO ARCHIPELAGO/ TUCHÍN/SAN ANTERO

Wander through Santa Cruz del Islote, the size of two soccer fields, making it one of the most densely populated islands on Earth. Later, the ship cruises into the San Bernardo archipelago, calling at San Antero. After lunch, visit Tuchín, an indigenous village celebrated as the birthplace of the sombrero *vueltiao*, the hat considered a national symbol of Colombia. Observe *vueltiao* makers at work, and then meet with the local Zenú community, known for their ingenious irrigation systems. Anchor tonight in San Antero. (B,L,D)

DAY 7: SANTA CRUZ DE LORICA/CISPATÁ BAY

Drive inland to Santa Cruz de Lorica, a charming riverside town with French, Belgian, English, Syrian, and Lebanese influences in its historic architecture and central square. After lunch, embark on a late afternoon cruise in the rarely explored Cispatá Bay, timed for optimum wildlife spotting, as native creatures emerge from their mid-day rest. This evening, *National Geographic Quest* continues the journey along the Colombian coastline. (B,L,D)

DAY 8: CARTAGENA/DISEMBARK/HOME

Upon arrival in Balboa, disembark and transfer to the airport in Cartagena for flights home. (B)

OPTIONAL PRE-VOYAGE EXTENSION: PANAMA CITY & SAN LORENZO—3 DAYS

Extend your stay in Panama City and have a private tour of the Panama Canal Museum at the Miraflores Locks, as well as a former U.S. Army base, Frank Gehry's BioMuseo, and two UNESCO World Heritage Sites—the historic Casco Viejo Old Town and the natural beauty and wildlife of the San Lorenzo Protected Area.

EXPEDITION EQUIPMENT: A fleet of 8 Zodiacs and 24 kayaks, paddleboards, remotely operated vehicle (ROV), hydrophone, splash-cam, underwater video camera, video microscope, snorkeling gear and wet suits for all guests (where applicable), and OM System Photo Gear Locker.

SPECIAL FEATURES: Guest internet access, elevator, certified photo instructor, and undersea specialist.

WELLNESS: The vessel is staffed by a wellness specialist and features a gym with an elliptical machine, treadmill, exercycles, handweights, and resistance bands. Treatments in the LEXspa are available by appointment.



CATEGORY 4: Upper Deck #207-212, 214-229 Cabins face outside with a sliding glass door and small private balcony, feature two single beds that can convert to a queen, a writing desk, two night-stands, full length mirror and, a closet.

CATEGORY 5 (SUITE): Observation Deck #101-108 Cabins face outside with a large view window, feature two single beds that can convert to a queen, a writing desk, two nightstands, full length mirror, convertible sofa bed to accommodate a third person, expanded bathroom and, extra closet space.
